A story gets published online **linking** to either the repository item page or bitstream

When a first reader **clicks** the link in that story, **the repository learns** automatically about the existence of the story through the referral attribute

In the repository, the new story is listed as *unverified*, both on the **item page**, as on the **dynamically generated PDF cover page**.

A team of "**Fake News Fighters**" receives an alert about the appearance of the new story, requesting them to look for any misrepresentation or false information

These Fighters qualify the story either as

**OK** - *"The story was reviewed by Jim Babson on 2019-06-06. No major conflicts between the view of the author and the story were detected."*

**CAUTION** - *"The story was reviewed by Jim Babson on 2019-06-06. The story contains misrepresentation, false information or otherwise views that do not align with the point of view of the author of this article."*
